

Alberta Separation?

Facebook posting, Jan. 19, 2026: I'm done pretending this conversation is something it isn't.

I'm a white, male, Christian conservative living in Alberta, and I make no apologies for it. I'm also firmly pro-Alberta separation, because what's happening to this country is happening without my consent.

Let's start with the fact that people hate acknowledging:

White people are a global minority. Roughly 15% of the world's population is of European descent. That's it. The other 85% of the world is not. So, the endless talk of "global white dominance" is dishonest on its face.

And before anyone twists this into something it's not: I do not believe in race as a biological hierarchy. Race is a social construct. Always has been.

What I do believe in is culture. And culture is not just food, music, or holidays.

Culture is:

- The type of government a society builds
- The laws it enforces
- The infrastructure it designs and maintains
- The social norms that create trust and order
- The inventions, institutions, and ideas that shape daily life

By that definition, Canada, the United States, and Europe did not happen by accident.

Modern Western civilization, constitutional government, individual rights, freedom of speech, equality under the law, advanced infrastructure, scientific progress, and high-trust society was created by a small global minority. Not because of skin color, but because of values, institutions, and cultural foundations rooted in Western and Christian traditions. That matters.

Immigration itself is not the issue. Mass immigration without limits, without integration, and without public consent is.

What's happening now is not normal immigration. Its demographic transformation driven by federal policy, imposed from the top down, and justified by moral blackmail. The people pushing it will never live with the consequences. Alberta will.

And Alberta did not ask for this. Alberta did not vote for this direction. Alberta did not consent to becoming a laboratory for ideological experiments designed in Ottawa, Toronto, or global institutions that do not share our values or priorities.

A nation or a province is not just an economy. It's not just GDP. It's a shared social contract.

When large numbers of people are brought in from cultures with fundamentally different views on law, religion, speech, authority, and individual rights, and integration is treated as optional, the existing culture will change. Every time. History is clear on this. Pointing that out is not hate. It's reality.

Let me be clear:

- I am not calling for violence
- I am not calling for mistreatment
- I am not saying anyone is inferior

What I am saying is this: I do not consent to my culture, my faith, my province, or the civilization my ancestors helped build being dismantled while I'm told to stay quiet or be ashamed.

If you come to Alberta or Canada to live peacefully, work hard, respect our laws, and accept the society you're entering welcome.

But if you come expecting:

- Canadians to censor themselves for your beliefs
- Our traditions to be erased because they're "offensive"
- Our history to be treated as shameful
- Our institutions to bend while yours remain untouched

Then no I don't support that. And I won't pretend I do.

Every non-white country on earth openly protects its culture, identity, and continuity. Japan does it. India does it. African nations do it. Middle Eastern nations do it. That's called sovereignty.

When Albertans or Canadians say the same thing, we're told we're immoral.

That double standard is dishonest.

This is why Alberta separation is no longer a fringe idea to me. It's about self-determination. It's about controlling our borders, our immigration policy, our institutions, and our future. It's about preserving a society that still believes in responsibility, freedom, faith, and common sense.

If Canada insists on moving in a direction that dismantles those foundations, Alberta has every right to choose a different path.

Wanting borders is not hatred.

Wanting integration is not racism.

Wanting continuity is not extremism.

Wanting self-government is not radical.

What is dangerous is telling people they have no right to object while their home is fundamentally reshaped without consent.

Canada doesn't belong to bureaucrats.

It doesn't belong to corporations.

And Alberta does not belong to Ottawa.

It belongs to the people who built it, live in it, and still believe in it.

I'm one of them. And I'm not backing down.
